Letter from the President

Dear Colleagues,

First, I would like to thank all of you for your hard work: teaching, treating, and supervising. As you know, it has been CAPA's policy that none of the teachers, treaters or supervisors are paid by CAPA. This is part of the tradition of "giving back" what we have been given. Only treaters are paid and they are paid by their CAPA patients. This payment has been understood as a way of helping the students understand how fees are negotiated between treaters and their patients-not like the bargaining so common in China.

In recent years, it has become somewhat difficult to recruit supervisors. Why? A very large proportion of CAPA members were recruited by me. I know many people in the analytic world and have been recruiting for a very long time.Many of the people I recruited are quite old. I hope I can say this without being accused of ageism. I may be the oldest person still active in CAPA. When you receive this, I will be 89 years old. And, alas, old people tend to fall ill, even die, or have aged and ill spouses to care for. We hope that by asking the students to pay a small sum (\$50/supervisory session for 30 sessions/year) we will encourage some of our current members to supervise and encourage some younger people to join CAPA. Many analytic organizations charge for supervision. A small number of students guarantees a full practice and that CAPA has a loan fund with low interest charged while enrolled. Also, current YR2 & YR4 students were given a tuition discount to balance costs as they completed their programs.

Some news in the analytic world concerns problems within APSA reported on various listservs. I am not at liberty to discuss other difficulties. I am a member of the APSA Board of Directors. In the interest of transparency and diversity, it occurs to me that it would be a good idea to ask ALL OF YOU, students, graduates, longtime CAPA members, new CAPA members (it is very difficult to specify people without the risk of insulting someone) to write directly to me with suggestions about things CAPA might do or change or improve both our organization and the things we do. Please e-mail me: <u>Elise Snyder, M.D.</u> with your

ideas. I do not intend this as an arena for complaint or criticism. It is an arena for constructive suggestions.

CAPA's Treatment Program

Before CAPA as we know it today was even a glimmer in our eye, Elise was approached by people in China looking for treatment. About a year later, when Elise embarked on facilitating a training program in China, she recognized from the training model in the U.S. that individual treatment is as crucial as the supervision and coursework. We thus thought it would be helpful to offer opportunities for treatment for CAPA students in both analysis and psychodynamic psychotherapy. This tripartite model of training – supervision, coursework, and treatment – created the foundation of CAPA. The Treatment Program has therefore been an integral part of CAPA from the get-go.

Since its inception, the Treatment Program has grown in the number of students who are enthusiastic about receiving treatment. For students, treatment is recommended because anyone who decides to do clinical work should examine their own conflicts and blind spots before embarking on helping other people. Understanding yourself in this deeper way is just as important as taking coursework, as it helps to avoid inflicting your issues and hang-ups on your clients. Feedback from the many CAPA graduates indicates that their own introduction to therapy was an integral part of their training.

The treaters come to learn a lot about Chinese culture through their work with trainees as well. There are differences in the culture which need to be recognized and accommodated. Treatment is a learning and growing experience for both the student/patient and treater, and it is typically a very mutually enriching experience.

CAPA's role is to facilitate referrals for students who are interested in treatment. I keep a database of CAPA members who are interested in low-fee treatment with CAPA students. Usually, my matchmaking between student/patients and treaters is a success. Sometimes, it is a poor fit for various reasons. In this case, it is perfectly fine for the student to come back to me and say this isn't working so well, and that they need another referral. This happens less than 10% of the time, because I think very carefully about the student's needs and to whom I am referring them.

Although CAPA makes recommendations for treatment fees, the fee is always subject to negotiation depending on individual circumstances. In most cases, it will be a more modest fee than what the analyst/therapist might charge in their home country. This is because the income scale is lower in China. The treater will carefully assess the student's individual circumstances, such as their income and what they are charging their own patients in China, to determine the fee. The greater the frequency (sessions per week) of the treatment, the lower the individual fee per session will be.

The only aspect of treatment that CAPA documents is the start and termination dates of the treatment, as well as the fee. Treatment is entirely confidential, and the only people with access to this limited information are Dr. Fishkin and the designated CAPA administrators. We do not monitor the treatments nor oversee them in any way.

Member Interview

Richard Ruth, Ph.D.

Richard Ruth, Ph.D. agreed to be interviewed for this issue of the newsletter and submitted these responses on February 19, 2023. CAPA learned of his passing on April 9, 2023. We are fortunate to have been his colleagues, students and friends. He was a CAPA member from 2012 until his death.

Where do you live and practice?

Washington, DC area.

Describe your current work and/or type of practice, or if retired, describe the work you used to do.

I see patients for psychoanalysis and psychotherapy; provide supervision for graduate students and working professionals; and do neuropsychological and psychological evaluations.

Please describe your career path, including your educational development such as additional degrees or institutes you attended as you built your career.

I am from South America. After receiving degrees back home in clinical and medical psychology, and a doctorate in interdisciplinary Latin American studies, I was part of the second group of psychologists in my country who, in a contentious process at the time, were accepted for psychoanalytic training. After coming to the United States because of dangers to me and many others in my country, I had to get my degrees all over again at a US university- and did so. At the time, psychologists were not accepted at most US psychoanalytic institutes, and I went into practice, missing the institute culture in which I had thrived but feeling I needed to start a new chapter in my new country. I am now retired from a career teaching clinical psychology, and LGBT studies, at a university. As a retirement project, I pursued a long- term dream and studied for rabbinic ordination, which I received in January. I have worked in community mental health; for several years at Chestnut Lodge Hospital; and in private practice.

Who would you say is the person that influenced your career the most, and how so?

The psychoanalyst Marie Langer, who I was fortunate to have as a supervisor and mentor. She taught me that psychoanalysis and progressive politics were not incompatible, and, through her groundbreaking work using psychoanalytic treatment to help previously infertile women conceive and deliver babies, the power of psychoanalysis to have a transformative impact on people struggling to overcome serious problems in life.

How did you first hear of CAPA, and please describe why you feel a connection to CAPA's mission?

A friend and colleague who was working as a CAPA therapist and supervisor invited me to a dim sum lunch. There, I met Elise Snyder. Like so many of you, I was impressed, charmed, and immediately seduced. I was pleased to learn that CAPA accepts all kinds of psychoanalytic clinicians, of diverse professions and backgrounds and from a variety of psychoanalytic theoretical orientations. Since then, I have had fulfilling experiences teaching and supervising CAPA trainees. In addition to the considerable pleasure working with such talented and motivated students, being on the "ground floor" and playing a small part in the process of bringing the potential of psychoanalytic psychotherapy and psychoanalysis to a rapidly modernizing China that needs us and that growing numbers of people in China value is exciting beyond measure.

Working with individuals and couples; recently discovering in myself the intention of using inter-personal techniques; and long-last interest in existentialism related issues.

In three words, can you describe your experience at CAPA so far?

Ripple; Cave; Interstellar roaming.

What has helped your practice the most since you began training at CAPA?

I would say being together with my lovely site mates has helped me the most. Practicing psychotherapy is a comparatively lonely journey, and it helps a lot both professionally and emotionally to have a group to share with and get responses to my clinical experience and theoretical confusions.

Do you envision yourself staying involved with CAPA after you graduate, and if so, how?

Yes, certainly. What options are there? Haha...

I've been thinking recently about how can psychoanalysis better tackle psychological problems in contemporary Chinese society, and enable people to have more meaningful living experiences, since the psychological troubles we are mainly facing have shifted from libido repression to the feeling of drifting, meaningless, and disconnection.

It might be a good idea to have a psychology + art + tech festival regularly as a discussion of that.

What is one thing that has surprised you about CAPA?

Instructors are teaching for free!

In the photo, I was in front of the Omayad Mosque in Aleppo, north Syria. It used to be a beautiful town with a 4000 year history, and is now completed destroyed- first by civil war, followed by an earthquake. I was there in 2009, with a humanitarian aid mission, not knowing that was a once-and-only visit.

Since I was little, I have often felt connected with the feeling of helplessness – whether a homeless animal, people living under war, or natural disasters. I remember in my CAPA application interview, the interviewer reminded me that psychotherapy is NOT to "help" or "satisfy", but to "understand".

Where do you live and practice?

Chengdu, Sichuan

Describe your current work and/or type of practice.

I have been in my private practice for 8 years. I do psychotherapy from once per week to three times per week with adult patients. I do supervision too.

Reflecting back, what was your first thought when you heard of CAPA?

I can test original flavor. That's a good opportunity for me to learn psychoanalysis systematically.

During your time as a student, describe the most useful thing that CAPA helped you with (career'-wise or personally).

I think my own analysis and supervision are most useful. In terms of analysis, I experienced how difficult it is and how much courage you need as a patient to expose yourself to the analyst or therapist which helped me more empathic of my patient. But the reward from analysis is quite great. In terms of supervision, it is a good chance to learn how to practice hand by hand.

As a member of one of the earlier classes at CAPA, please describe why and how you have stayed connected with CAPA, even after graduating 5 or 10 years ago.

I felt very grateful for CAPA which offer us a chance to be so close to psychoanalysis. The lower tuition fee they offered did less burden me and made my study in CAPA possible. My study in CAPA is a turning point, is very significant which brought me a great progress no matter in terms of my career or personally.

I still get in touch with some of CAPA's teachers and participate a Sunday Supporting Group launched by CAPA since Pandemic .

Applying to CAPA: The Journey of an Applicant

Starting Point: Opening the Application Period

The application period is open for approximately 3.5 months, beginning late Fall through early Spring. Applicants start by opening a CAPA portal account to access the application form. The form provides detailed instructions and a list of prerequisites, and collects the biographical, educational, professional and personal information needed to get to know each applicant.

When considering applying to CAPA, applicants are informed of the application fee. However, the during first 30 days of the application period, the application fee is waived. After the specific date provided, applicants are required to pay the fee before their application can move to the next step.

The Next Step: ESL Assessments

If it is clear on the application form that an applicant has the required professional experience, degree, and residency, then they are invited to sign up for a time to have their English language skills assessed.CAPA has designed its own ESL assessment that evaluates oral communications and listening comprehension – the two most important English skills to succeed in CAPA's classroom environment.

At the end of each week, an ESL report is sent to the Chair of the Admissions Committee to conduct another review of the applicant's experience and their ESL score. If both are within the acceptable range, the applicant is ready for the next step – two member interviews. If the applicant does not meet the minimum ESL score and/or does not have the required experience (which is also discussed further in the ESL screening) then they are sent a determination letter that clearly explains the reason why they are not being considered further and what they can do to become a stronger applicant in the future.

The Two Member Interviews: How You can Get Involved

CAPA recruits members to help interview applicants. In recent years we've had about 150 applicants each year, and nearly half of them reach this step in the application process.With 70+ applicants, that means more than 140 interviews are conducted! When an applicant receives scores that are inconsistent or opposing, a third interview is required to get to know the applicant better.

This takes a large amount of time for all involved – for administrators, members, and applicants alike. This step alone can take up to 4 months to complete. The more members who volunteer to interview, the faster the process goes. Becoming an interviewer is easy, the experience is rewarding, and the result can be a long-lasting connection with a Chinese colleague.

Almost the Last Step: Admissions Committee Review

Once all applicants have had their interviews, members of the Admissions Committee are sent the materials and a scoresheet with a scoring rubric to rate the applicants. Each applicant is assigned randomly to at least 3 committee members, who rate them. The scores are then collected and applicants are ranked based on their ratings.


The Final Step: Inviting the New Incoming Class

The CAPA staff then notifies all applicants of the Admissions Committee's determinations. The top 40 applicants are invited; 5 applicants who have been waitlisted are notified; and those who are not in the top 45 are sent a determination letter. This letter explains the reason the applicant is not being invited, what they can do to become a stronger applicant in the future, and policies for reapplying. This final step often takes place at the end of May/beginning of June.

Over the summer, many details are finalized for the new incoming class: summer readings, site assignments, site coordinators, PEPWeb membership, class syllabi and schedules, etc... Welcome to CAPA!









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
